Land Acknowledgement

All Saints' Peterborough resides on the sacred land of the Michi Saagiig Anishinaabeg, the first peoples of this land. We offer our respect to those ancestors who may be buried in this land. This sacred land is part of the Rice Lake Purchase, Treaty 20. All Saints' is committed to continued reconciliation with our Indigenous siblings, through continued education and the inclusion of readings from the First Nations Bible.

Liturgical Notes

1. In the context of Christian Liturgy, Israel does not refer to the current political state, but either to the historic Hebrews (also called Israelites) of the ancient Near East or, in Christian theology, to all people who put their faith and trust in God as the ancient peoples of God.
2. Younger and Elder Testament. The traditional terms for the testaments 'Old' and 'New' have been changed to Elder and Younger. This has been done as an act of equity and promise. Old and New are words in our society that add value to things – often anything that is old is considered less valuable than things that are new. In our Christian context the New Testament has replaced the Old Testament, which is not only an incorrect theology, but it has also tied to it ethnic value, and antisemitic tones. The words Elder and Younger are born out of equity, and the Younger Testament is born out of the Elder Testament.

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

Reading *Genesis, 2:15-17, 3:1-7, Inclusive Bible*

A reading from the Elder Testament and the book of beginnings, Genesis. Then God took the earth creature and settled it in the Garden of Eden so that it might cultivate and care for the land. God commanded the earth creature, "You may eat as much as you like from any of the trees of the garden—except the tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil. You must not eat from that tree, for on the day that you eat from that tree, that is a day you will die—yes, die."

But the snake was even more naked: the most cunning of all the animals that God had made. The snake asked the woman, "Did God really tell you not to eat from the trees in the garden?"

The woman answered the snake, "We may eat fruit from all the other trees in the garden. But of the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden, God said, 'Do not eat it and do not touch it, or you will die.'

The snake said to the woman, "Die? You will not die! God knows well that on the day that you eat it, your eyes will be opened, and you will be like gods, knowing good and evil!"

The woman knew that the tree was enticing to the eye, and now she saw that the fruit was good to eat—that it was desirable for the knowledge it could give. So, she took some of its fruit and ate it. She gave some also to the man beside her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened, and they realized that they were naked. So, they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloth for themselves.

Psalm 32 is a powerful penitential psalm attributed to King David, traditionally believed to have been written after his assault of Bathsheba. It describes the heavy burden of unconfessed sin and the immense relief and joy found in God's forgiveness. I invite you to read the psalm with me.

Happy are those whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered.
Happy are those to whom God imputes no iniquity,
and in whose spirit there is no deceit.

While I kept silence, my body wasted away through my groaning all day long.

For day and night your hand was heavy upon me;
my strength was dried up as by the heat of summer.

Then I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not hide my iniquity;
I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to God',
and you forgave the guilt of my sin.

Therefore, let all who are faithful offer prayer to you;
at a time of distress the rush of mighty waters shall not reach them.

You are a hiding-place for me; you preserve me from trouble;
you surround me with glad cries of deliverance.

I will instruct you and teach you the way you should go;
I will counsel you with my eye upon you.

Do not be like a horse or a mule, without understanding,
whose temper must be curbed with bit and bridle, else it will not stay
near you.

Many are the torments of the wicked, but steadfast love surrounds those
who trust in the Holy One. Be glad in God and rejoice, O righteous,
and shout for joy, all you upright in heart.

A reading from the Younger Testament and the wisdom of the Indigenous ancestors who kept this land, from the ancient text of Paul's letter to the Church in Rome.

Here is another way to see what I am saying. Red Clay (Adam) was the first human being to fail to live the life he was created for. His broken ways brought death to all who followed in his footsteps, for death comes from following bad hearts and broken ways. These broken ways were already at work in the world, even before our tribal law was given. But where there is no law, no one can be guilty of breaking it.

Even so, death still came to all who lived from Red Clay (Adam) to Drawn from the Water (Moses), who gave us the law. Yes, death ruled over all who walked in broken ways, even over the ones who did not fail in the same way Red Clay (Adam) failed. But as we will see, Red Clay (Adam) was in many ways like the one who would come later, the Chosen One.

But not in all ways, for the false step of Red Clay (Adam) cannot be compared with the gift of the Creator's great kindness shown to us in the Chosen One. If one man's failure brought death to human beings, then how much more will Creator's great kindness, gifted to us through the goodwill of one man—Creator Sets Free (Jesus) the Chosen One—overflow to all with new life!

Here is another way to see it. Red Clay's (Adam's) one failure was repeated over and over again, bringing guilt and shame to all who followed in his footsteps. But the gift of Creator's great kindness overcame those many failures and gave human beings a path to good standing with him once again.

If death overcame all human beings because of the war wrongdoing of one man, then how much greater will it be for the ones who receive this gift of good standing and overflowing kindness? I will tell you! Through Creator Sets Free (Jesus), the Chosen One, they will guide others with the wisdom and honour of a chief as they walk this road of life!

And if the false steps of one man lead to guilt and shame for all human beings, than another man's true and firm steps will bring life in good standing to all human beings. Again, if one man who followed his bad heart passed it on to many others, than one man who walks with a good and upright heart will pass on that good heart to many others.

Make us turn to you alone.


