## From the **Pastor's** desk

I want to start this letter with gratitude, I am so grateful for our journey together. Many of you do not see the amazing work that this parish is doing, the lives we are impacting, and the transformation that comes with loving our neighbour. The two weeks of Discovery Camp consisted of thousands of moments with children - and parents and caregivers. Children asking questions about God, learning how to be people of faith and good citizens. In August the whole campus of All Saints' was filled with

the sound of singing. The children learned three songs by heart and sung from their hearts. Many of them have signed up for the All Saints' Junior Choir, and we have children and parents/caregivers in church who have never been in church before. Then there are the people who come to our door for a drink and a snack bar are grateful for the moment of dignity they experience at the door. Individuals and families who access our food ministry are so grateful not only for the food, but for

> the relationships that are built and the support that is offered. One of the most sacred witnesses to the power of God's love are the pastoral visits made by Suzanne, Cormac, Rose, and me. Visits that offer as much to those of us who visit, as those we visit. I am grateful to have a front row seat to the wonder of the love of God poured out freely. We can be proud of all we are and do in God's name, and we can also do more.

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At the end of June, I spent a week at Yale in New Haven, Connecticut, It was a one-week intensive of a year-long program called the Leader's Way. The program pulled together 50 Ănglican priests; I was the only Canadian, four from Africa, and the rest were American. The conversations were all centered around how do we reimagine the church for the 21st century. So, questions regarding 'who we are' and 'are we reflecting the gospel' were priority. It is difficult to imagine we are reflecting the gospel as fully as possible when there is so much violence, patriarchy, and racial tension in the language of our liturgies. Once we start exploring the institution, we find that we have become so enmeshed with the transactional capitalist society we live in. We have a lot of work to do. The Synod office is leading the way in Anti-Racism, Anti-Bias training, and the Cast the Net vision will be rolled out at Synod in November.

But what can we do here at All Saints'?

Decolonizing the church is all of our responsibility. We did not create the situation we find ourselves in, but we are obligated to start the work of untangling it. So as a result of my week at Yale, all the reading that has accompanied that, ongoing seminars, and

checking in with professors, our work until the New Year will be to educate ourselves and make meaningful changes in how we are church. Throughout September we will be exploring Patriarchy, what role has it played historically in our development, what if any power and authority does it have over us today, and can we reimagine it? October naturally heralds in gratitude; I think compassion is intimately linked to gratitude, so we will explore what that may look like in our lives of faith and worship. In November along with remembering the souls of those we love but no longer see, acknowledging the sacrifice of those who purchased our freedom with their blood, we will also explore the violence we live in, the violence in the scriptures, and how we might reframe it.

December brings us to Advent when our readings will come from the Woman's Lectionary for the Whole World. Throughout Advent we will consider the Incarnation and how it informs our ideas about patriarchy, gratitude and compassion, and violence.

I know this sounds crazy!

I hope for some it sounds interesting, or even hopeful.

I said this the very first day I was in the pulpit here as people of faith we have one job. We are to love God with all our heart, soul, and mind, with everything we are and have, and then we are to love our neighbours the way God loves us. It is my sincere prayer and hope that as we journey through these difficult topics throughout the fall, we will develop deeper relationships with the Divine and each other.

To God be all the Glory.



This one-day commemoration will take place Saturday, September 30th from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. We are excited to have Kim Lamothe as our guest speaker.


Kim is the Cultural Resource co-ordinator for the Nogojiwanog Friendship Centre in Peterborough.

Kim is a knowledge keeper, as well as the granddaughter of a residential school survivor; and she will be offering smudging for those interested. She will speak about her grandfather's experience surviving the residential schools; she will also talk about orange shirts, why we wear them; stolen land; water issues; missing children and found graves, the plight of missing and murdered indigenous women and girls (MMWIG) and the path to reconciliation.

What does that path look like? Is reconciliation possible, and if so, what will it take?

Kim's talk will be followed by a question-and-answer period, and then we will break for lunch, conversation and fellowship!

After lunch, Kari Lepine will lead us in a dotpainting workshop on rocks or small canvases.



Kari is Metis, is a mom, loves to paint, and she works as a full-time social worker at the Metis Band Office in Peterborough. She is artistic, enjoys crafts and teaches "dot pointing".

Marguerite Cook turned 107 last December 14. For more than 90 of those years she has graced the pews of All Saints'. It is a remarkable record; she is a remarkable person.

Full of grace and good will, humour and determination, she trays of favours for patients, says she has no secrets for living a long life, other than reading the Bible every day. "I don't know. I just go on my merry way. I don't indulge in the wrong kind of thing, I go to my church regularly, I trust in the Lord, and have a lot of friends," she told a reporter on her 105th birthday.

Marguerite was born in Knowlton, Quebec, and came to Peterborough with her family my friends," she once said. when she was 12. When she married her husband, Tom, they Marguerite is certainly one of built a home in 1953 on Park Street S., near the Otonabee River, where she remained following Tom's death in 1981 until she moved to Rubidge Hall about eight years ago.

Marguerite and Tom travelled widely — across Canada, and to the United States, England, Scotland, Ireland, and Italy. But home was here, in Peterborough, and at All Saints'.

And at the hospital, where for 60 years as a volunteer, she cared for babies and made and for which she received a medal from the Queen.

She rode and, with her sister, showed horses. She drove until she was 98.

Marguerite never hesitates to share her faith. It has sustained her through periods of loss over her long life. "I trusted in the Lord a lot because I have no one else but

the saints among us.
