


March 10 - Dust ~ What does it mean to be a disciple?


Throughout the five weeks of Lent we will explore characters in the the gospel narrative and the roles they played leading up to and in Holy Week as Jesus walks towards the crucifixion. Peter, Judas, Pilate, The Temple Authorities and Roman Empire, Jesus , and the Women at the empty tomb. All of these characters have unique positions, roles, understandings of who Jesus is, and responses. We will explore these and ask ourselves - what role are we playing in the ongoing narrative of the gospel in our world? Come as you are able, to one session, a few sessions, or all sessions.

Lenten Book Study

The Last Week is a provocative invitation into a reimagining of the meaning of the Last Week of Jesus' life. Read the book through Lent and on Wednesday in Holy Week join me for soup and a discussion.

Using the gospel of Mark as their guide, Borg and Crossan present a day-by-day account of Jesus's final week of life. They begin their story on Palm Sunday with two triumphal entries into Jerusalem. The first entry, that of Roman governor Pontius Pilate leading Roman soldiers into the city, symbolized military strength. The second heralded a new kind of moral hero who was praised by the people as he rode in on a humble donkey. The Jesus introduced by Borg and Crossan is this new moral hero, a more dangerous Jesus than the one enshrined in the church's traditional teachings.

The Last Week depicts Jesus giving up his life to protest power without justice and to condemn the rich who lack concern for the poor. In this vein, at the end of the week Jesus marches up Calvary, offering himself as a model for others to do the same when they are confronted by similar issues. Informed, challenged, and inspired, we not only meet the historical Jesus, but meet a new Jesus who engages us and invites us to follow him. (Harper Collins)
